



Veterans Services: Information Sheet

Current Situation

- 1 in 5 homeless individuals in the US is a veteran
- California has the largest veteran population in the US
- Female veterans are 2 to 3 times more likely to be homeless than male veterans
- Minority veterans are at a higher risk for homelessness, compared to non-minorities
- Young veterans (ages 18 to 30) are twice as likely as the general population to be homeless
- Inability to find and maintain sufficiency-level employment is a leading cause of homelessness, especially among younger veterans.

Volunteers of America provides assistance with housing, employment and more to homeless and “on the verge” veteran men, women and families in Sacramento, Yolo, El Dorado and Placer counties. Since its inception, VOA Veteran Services has given 509 veterans the tools to build brighter futures.

We aim to give homeless veterans and their families the tools to overcome their barriers to housing and employment, attain and maintain stable housing, find and keep sufficiency-level employment, and gain access to resources that will help them live positive, independent lives.
